
VAMPIRE BIRDS OF THE GALÁPAGOS!

Meet the world's creepiest bird — the vampire finch! These small brown birds live on remote islands in the Galápagos, off the coast of Ecuador. And yes, they really do drink blood!

During dry seasons, when food is scarce, vampire finches peck at the feathers of larger seabirds called boobies, sipping tiny drops of blood that ooze out. Luckily, the boobies don't seem too bothered — scientists think they've learned to tolerate it because the finches also help by picking off parasites.

This blood-sucking habit makes the vampire finch one of the strangest survivors in nature. They weren't always this way — their ancestors ate seeds and insects, but over thousands of years, they adapted to their harsh island home in the spookiest way possible.

NASA HEARS STRANGE SIGNALS FROM SPACE

Deep in space, mysterious bursts of energy are puzzling scientists — and they sound like something straight from a science-fiction story!

NASA's astronomers have detected what they call Fast
Radio Bursts (or FRBs). These are powerful flashes of radio
waves that come from galaxies millions of light-years away. Each
burst lasts less than a second but gives off more energy than the Sun does in a whole
year!

No one is quite sure what causes them. Some scientists think they come from neutron stars — the leftover cores of massive stars that exploded long ago. Others wonder if they could be linked to black holes... or something even stranger.

NASA's latest telescopes, like the James Webb Space Telescope and the Deep Space
Network, are helping to track these mysterious signals. Each new discovery gives
scientists clues about how the universe



It sounds like something from a Halloween story — scientists have found ancient "zombie viruses" frozen in the Arctic!


Researchers in Siberia (a very cold region in Russia) discovered viruses trapped inside permafrost, a layer of ground that stays frozen all year. Some of these viruses have been asleep for more than 48,000 years — since the time of the woolly mammoth!

The scientists carefully thawed tiny samples to study them in the lab. Don't worry — these viruses only infect microscopic amoebas, not humans or animals. The team wanted to see if ancient viruses could still "wake up" after thousands of years... and surprisingly, some did!

Why study them? Learning about these frozen germs helps scientists understand how viruses survive in extreme conditions — and how climate change might release long-buried microbes as the ice melts.

A MYSTERIOUS GREEN FIREBALL LIGHTS UP THE SKY!



People in Portugal and Spain recently looked up to see something that could have come straight out of a Halloween movie — a bright green fireball streaking across the night sky!

The strange light was caused by a meteor, a small space rock burning up as it entered Earth's atmosphere. NASA scientists explained that the green glow came from nickel, a metal found in many meteors. When it burns, it creates a dazzling emerald flash.


For a few magical seconds, the sky glowed bright green before the meteor broke apart and vanished. Videos from doorbell cameras and cars quickly spread online, with people comparing it to a "shooting star on steroids."


Fireballs like this aren't dangerous — most burn up long before they reach the ground. But they give scientists a chance to learn more about what's flying around our solar system.

So next time you're outside at night, keep your eyes on the stars. You never know when a fiery visitor might whoosh by!

THE MANY MISFORTUNES OF EUGENIA WANG



As Eugenia tries to balance homework, friendships, and her strange new ability, she discovers that her so-called "misfortunes" might actually be her greatest strength. When she's pulled into a mystery involving her school and the afterlife, she has to decide what kind of hero she really wants to be.

This graphic novel is filled with humour, heart, and a touch of the supernatural. The

comic-style illustrations burst with energy and emotion, making it easy to feel every awkward moment and every brave choice. It's also an important story about belonging, identity, and learning to be proud of who you are—even when you feel out of place.



BEHIND THE BOOK

Author and illustrator Stan Yan created The Many Misfortunes of Eugenia Wang to share a story he wished he'd had growing up. Like Eugenia, Stan often felt like an outsider—especially as one of the few Chinese-American kids in his school. Through Eugenia's adventures, he wanted to explore what it feels like to be different, to stand out, and to finally realise that those differences are actually your superpowers.

Stan also fills the book with elements of Chinese culture, from beliefs about ghosts and spirits to traditions about honouring ancestors. These details make the story feel real and help readers understand how culture can shape who we are.

In his own words, Stan says he hopes Eugenia's journey "helps kids feel seen" and reminds them that everyone's story matters—even the ones that begin with a few misfortunes.





Slimy bubbles hide their smell from sharks.






Some caterpillars disguise themselves as bird poo.
